Dear Parents,

This week we continue to look at some of the principles of Catholic Social Teaching and how we embed this into the everyday curriculum at St Joseph's.

- * Dignity of the Human Person
- * Stewardship of Creation
- * Common Good

- * Preferential Option for the Poor
- * Solidarity

* Subsidiarity and Participation

This week we focus specifically on the **Common Good.**



We can only live life in all its fullness when we are in relationships with others – through community. But what is true 'community'? It is created when we work together to improve the wellbeing of people in our society and the wider world – when we work for the Common Good. People who care for the Common Good are able to look beyond themselves to the circumstances of others.

This is another principle of Catholic Social Teaching which competes against societal pressures that emphasise the rights of the individual to personal possessions. Jesus teaches us that we need to move beyond a purely selfish way of thinking. Our own needs must be balanced with the needs of the disadvantaged and dispossessed.

Children learn to be good people by being around other people. They learn to be kind, to share, to take turns and how to make things fair, not just to some people, but to everyone. At school, our Social Emotional teaching programs and our St Joseph's Way approach to life teaches children that to live in community we don't need to be best friends with everyone, but we need to be:

- Welcoming greeting, treating and speaking to people as we like to be
- Encouraging acknowledging the efforts, achievements and stories of others willing to
- Say Sorry able to admit when we've done the wrong thing and be ready to make up
- Thankful appreciative of all that we are, all that we have and all we are given

Other strategies used at school to teach children concern for the Common Good are shared tasks; awareness raising activities; fundraising activities; acts of kindness and group projects. Our Play Is the Way Program is another way that we bring this to life in our school curriculum.

In the video below Wilson McCaskill discusses 'How to prepare children for school'. He identifies ways that home life and school life can work together to help children function more effectively at school. He focuses on rights, responsibilities, rules and routines and how these should be consistent across both home and school settings. These are things parents can institute at home to help build the social skills that children can benefit from in the school environment.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOR STAFF

Throughout the year teachers will sometimes be absent from class to participate in Professional Development. SATISFACTION SURVEYS 2017

Classroom News..

Pref. At the start of the week we continued with our English group rotations and we have been trying hard to remember to use our reading strategies independently when we come across words that we don't know. We traced, wrote and made sentences in our writing groups and continued with our sight words snap games and Reading Eggs program. We practiced 'counting on' a mathematical strategy with animal counters and some simple addition stories in our Maths group work. In Science we explored the weather, looking at different types of weather and suitable clothing. I have been away in Brisbane and would like to thank Yas Kemmerling and Amanda Sciklung who have also taught the Prep class this week.

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Yeas 1.. This week in English, our focus book was called "The Rainbow Fish". We will be using this story for the next few weeks as our focus will be on writing a description about the rainbow fish. We have also continued with show and share each day. In Mathematics, we have been learning about 3D shapes and directions. Plus, in Religion we have been talking about Noah's Ark and discussing why that story is important to us.

A big thank you to Mrs. Turner for having the year ones for two days this week while Miss Henderson was away doing some Professional Development.

Parent teacher interviews will be offered to all, starting in week 9. Look out for the email with the available times in the next few days.

We will continue with student reading in the flexible learning area between 8:40am and 9:00am. Thank you to all of the parents for your continued support with reading in the mornings.

Remember our Library day is on Friday, if your child forgets to bring their library bag in on a Friday, please feel welcome to see Mrs. Smith during the week to change them.

Yess 2.. This week we have been learning about Fractions in maths and have enjoyed playing games and doing hands on activities to help us understand this tricky concept of halves, quarters and eighths. We have had a tricky spelling pattern also and it is great to see so many students identifying words every day that match it. In Science we are finishing up our Water unit and next week will be doing assessment on that. We have started making our Identity books and there are some very excited children and some amazing writing happening. We loved playing Cat and Mouse in PTW also.

Year 3.. Year 3 have finished their unit on Information Reports and their museum of "The Real Rocks and Minerals of Minecraft" is on display for the school community to learn from. Next week we will begin our unit on poetry and will be learning about literary features such as rhyme, rhythm, similes and metaphors and alliteration.

In Math the students have been learning about measurement and revising fractions. In HASS they're comparing a modern day classroom with one seen in Mary McKillop's day and they're busy building their dioramas to showcase the differences.

Yess 4.. This week has been a busy one in Year 4. We have completed our probability and symmetry assessments in Maths. Next week we will be learning about maps and how to locate specific locations and give directions. In English we made Mrs Haardt's terrible story much better by adding more details and adjectives, we also corrected the punctuation too. Next week we will finish our narrative story unit. Mrs Haardt will assess our reading and email our Term 2 and 3 reading goals home, so you know how to help us with our reading. Our Science Unit will be completed in Week 9 as we have a few students away next week. Keep sending in the soil and rock samples. The Geography sustainability project is due next week and Mrs Haardt is looking forward to seeing the many different ideas we have come up with to make Weipa more sustainable. In Religion we are learning about the sacraments, including Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Marriage, Anointing of the Sick, and Holy Orders.

Year 5 - 6.. Well, Week 7 has come and gone, and what a week it was! Year 5/6 delved further into "The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe" by connecting Aslan to other characters and historical figures. We were able to make many strong connections between Aslan and Jesus and students are excited to see what happens next! In maths, we looked at coordinates. Year 5's used grid references to locate objects and describe routes, whilst year 6s used Cartesian plane ordinate pairs to conduct a similar activity. All students enjoyed practising these skills through games of "battleship". In Science and English, we have continued to create our explanation comic strips to explain that "the Earth is part of a series of planets that orbit the sun". Most students also completed their coding course for technologies, with the rest set to complete this by next week. This course shows that the students have a basic understanding of coding terms. With each passing week the year 6s are growing more excited about the prospect of moving into high school and all are excited about the plans that are coming together for their **Year 6 camp** to be held next term! Ms Harrison and Miss Cook will be holding an information night regarding this next week. Further, please note that **parent-teacher interviews** will be open to all 5/6 parents for weeks 9 and 10.
