





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Classroom News...

Prep... This week in Prep we had lots of fun on "Crazy Sock Day" and enjoyed having the coin race out on the basketball court with the whole school. In Maths we matched the correct number digits, with number words, dots and picture cards. In English we wrote a recount about going swimming on Friday mornings together. We also continued our English group rotations with year one. In Health we revisited the terms "Recognise, React and Report". In Science we made observations and drew pictures of things that move inside the classroom and outside the classroom. In Geography we drew a picture of a place that is special to us and listed ways that we can care for this special place. We also looked at reasons why places are special to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People. We would like to wish all of our Grandparents a "Happy Grandparents Day" this weekend.

Year 1... This week we have all been doing a lot of assessments and working really hard. The students all came to school wearing their best crazy socks and as a school, each class lined up their amount of coins collected and measured the length of the collected coins. Our class made nearly 5 metres, this was a very good effort. We have done a few science experiences focusing on light and sound. In Health, we have been talking about identifying situations that feel safe or unsafe. We have continued saying the Rosary and all of the students are becoming more confident in saying the Hail Mary. In our Religion lesson this week we discussed what the Hail Mary prayer means. The students have continued to enjoy swimming and are demonstrating their organizational skills very well. If anyone is available between 8:40 and 9:00am, we will continue with student reading in the Flexible Learning Area. Library day will stay on a Friday and Homework will be due on a Monday this term.

Year 2... All the Year 2 students have been working really hard this week and I am so proud of the way many of the children are showing resilience and persistence, especially when learning gets tough and they get tired. This is a life skill and I think we are doing this pretty well at St Joseph's. In Maths we are continuing to look at using the hundreds board and a number line to help us add 2 digit numbers together (eg 33 + 56) as well as use partitioning strategies. We are learning how important it is to count efficiently in 10's, 5's and 2's to help us with these tasks. We continue to discover what life was like in Jesus' time through some Bible stories, and we completed an assessment task on this today. Our houses are coming along and it has been a great challenge for many of us as well as learning skills about clay and natural materials. In class we have been looking at Roald Dahl as our focus Author and we are cringing at the antics of The Twits story, but lots of laughs! Our Poetry work is developing well and this week we have written 2 acrostic poems and 2 couplet poems. For our History unit every student has been set a speaking task about a Toy from the Past and we have been looking at how technology has changed our toys, our transport and other things. Best news for the kids is that we won the coin line challenge for the Crazy Sock day!!!



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Year 3... This was another jam packed week of learning and assessments. Miss Cass has been working with us on evaluative language, spelling of ordinal numbers and completing their end of year assessments. We have also spent time this week learning how to research our volunteer organisations for our Civics assessment and putting the information into a Google slide for presentation. Mrs Saunders explained to us the different sources of energy and we discussed how to make a solar oven. We will be constructing our ovens next week and cooking ourselves a treat or meal on Thursday. The best day was Wednesday when we were able to learn about the Torres Straits from Miss Tari who was born on Thursday Island and her local knowledge was exciting to ask questions about.

Year 4... This week we built our marble runs and realised that the designs we imagined were very tricky to build practically. We wrote a reflection on materials, properties, friction and design solutions. In Maths we excelled at decimal numbers, Mrs B had to think of some tricky problems to try and stump us. We are nearing the end of our class novel, Tom Appleby and are selecting an historical figure to research for our final English and History assessment. This was a busy week in Religion – we had fun wearing our crazy sock and we raised \$62.50 for Sock it to Poverty, we are very proud of this. We also discussed the sacrament of Reconciliation and what this means for us individually, as a school community and as a church community.

Year 5 ... The year five students had a splendid time in their small class of nine. This girls only class tackled each task with determination and completed each task ahead of time. The students have been working tirelessly on their dance performances with quite a few goosebump moments as they are outstanding. All teaching staff are very proud of the upcoming leaders of the school. They have displayed wisdom, respect and kindness throughout the week. Well done girls!

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Year 6 Camp 2017

Day 1: Travel Day

9 students and their parents/guardians lined the drop-off point at Weipa airport last Sunday, full of nerves and excitement. We couldn't believe the day had finally arrived. We were headed to Brisbane! After saying goodbye to our families, Ms Harrison, Miss Cook and Mr Dorahy took the 9 year six students under their wings. We checked-in, boarded, and headed off on our adventure. Each flight was filled with laughs, and memorable moments. On the way to Luther Heights Youth Camp in Coolum that evening, our bus driver was courteous enough to allow us to stop for a special Macca's dinner.





Day 2: Australia Zoo

Our morning started off with a hot breakfast at Luther Heights, which quickly became our favourite meal of every day. We headed off by bus to Australia Zoo where we took a tour around the zoo then experienced a keeper chat and pat. This included getting up close to a koala, blue tongue lizard and snake! We learnt all about echidnas, crocodiles, and even the zoo's albino python. After our education programs, we ate lunch in the Crocoseum with a great view of the Wildlife Warrior show. Our free time to wander the park included a visit to the new meerkat enclosure, which reminded us of the way some members of our class stand up straight and alert when they hear a chip packet opening. We finished off the day with a walk along the beach.







Day 3: Camp Activities

This was one of the most highly anticipated days of the trip. After weeks of excitement, we would finally face the challenge of the MASSIVE flying fox. The morning was filled with a "warm-up" in the cold Brisbane waters during body boarding lessons with the Coolum Surf Club. The kids and Miss Cook really enjoyed being able to swim in the ocean without the worry of crocs. Mr Dorahy also had some fun catching some waves on his surf board. After lunch we strapped into our harnesses and zoomed down the hill on the zip-line. Miss Cook led the way and both her and Ms Harrison then waited at the base of the hill to help each child off the line. We almost lost Patrick as he didn't quite make it to the end, and Miss Cook had to rescue him with a rope! The coffin-drop, a running start, and turning upside down were a few of the favourite moves experienced at this activity. To finish off our day of fun, we went down to the dam to try our hands at problem solving. The students were given bamboo poles, some big plastic tubs and some rope to build a raft that would get their team to the other side of the water. Both teams had lots of fun building and "sailing" their rafts. Although they learnt that each knot should be checked before leaving the harbour as both rafts fell apart not long after departure!







Day 4: St Stephen's Mission Mass & Sir Thomas Brisbane Planetarium

We travelled into the city via bus and caught the train to central station. From there we walked to St Stephen's Cathedral where they were holding this year's Mission Mass to celebrate the "Sock it to Poverty" initiative and bring awareness to Mission Month in the Catholic Church. The Cathedral was stunning and all students represented our school well. Afterwards we had a BBQ lunch with the other schools in attendance and met 3 other year 6 groups from St Joseph's schools! They were very impressed with the Ugandan doll we had brought with us and are excited to take up the project as well. The bus then took us to Mt Coot-tha where we visited the Brisbane Planetarium. The live show was incredible and we learnt so much about how stars are made. The students (and staff/parent) were exhausted, so it was early to bed before our trip home.







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Day 5: Travel Day

Up at 6am to leave at 7am for the airport. 12 tired Weipians ate their final hot breaky, thanked the amazing staff at Luther Heights, and bundled themselves into the bus. It was a long day of travel and the students handled themselves well. We were lucky enough to be able to travel out to the shopping centre in Cairns for lunch during our 4 hour layover, giving the students a chance to stretch their legs. They arrived back in Weipa safely at 6pm to the embrace of family with many exciting stories to tell.
