Dear Parents and Caregivers,

As parents we are all concerned about the wellbeing of our own children and hopefully that of other children as well. Wellbeing is often thought of as happiness but it is more than that. We need to feel worthwhile, with lives that are fulfilling and meaningful. At St Joseph's we, as staff are committed to the wellbeing and learning of all students. It is at the heart of all we do.

We need the skills to create close personal connections and a network of strong relationships that give us a sense of belonging. We need the skills of emotional intelligence and social competency if we are to really feel like "WELL-BEINGS."

Australia, despite its wealth and high standard of living, has alarming levels of childhood depression, self-harm and suicide. Our so called "good life" has not protected us from this sad fact. Evidence proves that children with strong pro-social behaviour tend to lead more positive lives, have more meaningful relationships, enjoy better physical and mental health and do better at school.

In the light of such evidence, many schools are making a commitment to the sustained and thorough development of pro-social behaviour.


School though, is not the only place where children learn. Even with five hours a day, for five days a week, for four terms a year children still do most of their "learning for life" outside school. In fact, most of their character shaping comes from family influences.

What they learn within the family allows them to apply it outside the family. Hopefully, what they have learnt allows them to conform to the demands and expectations of community standards in behaviour and to the requirements of everyday school life and learning.

Everyone in a school community has a role to play in helping children become independent, mature, socially competent, emotionally intelligent and successful human beings.

News from the APRE – Term 2 Week 6.

Half the term has lapsed already and lots has transpired. This week some of our students took part in the ICASS Digital Technologies testing and found it to be a very positive and glad they took on the challenge. Over the next few weeks a few more tests will be undertaken in different learning areas. If you nominated your child to undertake a test I will be in contact a few days prior to the test date.

Today at assembly we read a prayer to pay our respects to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people of Australia to say sorry. Friday 26th May is National Sorry Day and it is this day that gives people the chance to come together and share the steps towards healing for the Stolen Generations, their families and communities. We as a school community were invited to write some messages onto hands that would be used in the 'Sea of Hands' display being constructed on the lawn of the Bishop's House. I was fortunate enough to be able to see the display being constructed and have included some photos below. In recognition and respect we will also be creating a 'Sea of Hands' to display next week at the front of the school so please take some time to have a look and reflect upon what it means.

The hands contain messages about reconciliation, equality, change, recognition, prayer and support. Next week we will also pay our respects by holding a Prayer service to begin Reconciliation Week. This service will be held on Monday 29th May at 2.30pm on the lawn beside the basketball court. All are welcome to join us for this event which not only celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Referendum but also 25 years since the Mabo decision was handed down.

END OF SEMESTER 1 REPORTS

Next week preparation will begin for the writing of reports cards for Semester 1. Report cards are one way that teachers provide feedback to parents about their child's learning. We are reminded that many of the important aspects of learners can't be formally assessed and that these reports are summative by nature – they don't tell the full story. 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Classroom News..

Prep.



In Prep this week we had a visit from Miss Tari who spoke with us about the importance of Country to Indigenous people. We made handprints and participated respectfully in a whole school Liturgy for Sorry Day. We have been learning about Informative texts and comparing them to Imaginative texts. We practiced writing sentences with capital letters and full stops at the end. We have been learning the days of the week, matching words to digits and placing numbers on a number line. We talked about the properties of a wooden cross and other materials in Science. We have had a great week!

Year 1..

Every Year One parent should be very proud of all the hard work and good behaviour their child has demonstrated this week. In English, our big book this week was called "Mrs Wishy-Washy and the Big Wash". We used our comprehension cubes to ask questions relating to the story. We have also been looking at what tricky words are. In Mathematics, we have done some graphing and looked at the possibility of something occurring using the language of will, won't or might happen. Please remember homework is due on a Wednesday and our Library day is on a Friday. To help support our Prep and Year One students with role playing, we are asking if anyone has any children's dress ups they would like to donate to help assist us. Thank you in advance.

Year 2 ...

Today is Sorry Day and we have had some really interesting discussions with the support of Ms Tari about what this means to us. Most people say Sorry to others when they know they have done something to upset someone. We teach this to our own kids at home and at school it is embedded in our school covenant. But the meaning of Sorry Day is much more than that, it is about acceptance, inclusion and treating everyone equally which we do really well here at St Joseph's. We spoke about how many people are still hurting and we have talked about remembering the traditions and culture of indigenous people, embracing the stories and celebrating the many successes which lead to Sorry Day. Our Yr 2 students really enjoyed designing their hand and other artwork which has helped increase awareness and made connections in our local area about Sorry Day.

Year 3..

This week all the students performed their cooking procedure in their own TV segment as the culminating assessment piece for our third English unit. Never have I ever been more proud of the hard work and bravery it took to complete it. Their videos are on their google drive or Ipad ready for upload and editing. In Math we've been focusing on mental computation and subtraction. All the students' Ipads now have Targeting Maths 3 on there and they are busy completing the challenges at home to collect badges of merit. There are opportunities for multiplayer mental math so there is Math fun for the whole family! Next week we are starting our newspaper article unit and our class will transform into Junior Journos writing articles as well recording their own news shows using iMovie news templates. It is going to be exciting!

Year 4 ..

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This week the Year 4's started their times table challenge in Maths. An email was sent out about this, please contact me if you did not receive this. We have also been learning how to write our own word problems when given an answer instead of a maths sum. In English we are finishing our character profiles about either Charlotte or Wilbur. We have finished reading the book and will have a movie morning when I have all students present at school. After this we will be completing individual inquiry questions relating to Charlotte's Web and choosing our own way of answering these to share with the class. Science has us looking at "Friends or Foe", where we are currently looking at how bees pollinate plants. Our History Unit on "First Australians" saw a new app being installed on our iPads. We have listened to the story in the "Ngurrara" app and enjoyed making rock carvings. Thanks Miss Tari for the app suggestion. You hopefully received a hello card with three different ways of saying hello in nearby Aboriginal tribal languages. Lastly in Religion we have been introduced to meditation. We are saying the chant "ma-ra-na-tha" whilst sitting with our eyes closed. It is a bit hard for some students but we are slowly getting better.

Year 5 - 6..

The weeks seem to be flying by in 5/6. This week we started researching for and writing our persuasive speeches. We are arguing whether or not Australian primary schools should become more like French primary schools. Our arguments are becoming stronger every session and we are focussing on bringing together all our knowledge about constructing persuasive texts into one piece. Our maths focus was subtracting fractions. We found that these had the same process to follow as when we add fractions! We must first make sure that the denominators are the same. If they aren't then we need to find equivalent fractions to make them the same. Then we can add or subtract the fractions to find the answer. In religion we are studying parts of the Gospels to see how different authors have represented Jesus. Finally, in science we have finished studying solids, liquids AND gases. Next week we will be experimenting with heat and how this can change the properties of some of these materials.

This is an invitation to everyone - please come, put this afternoon aside and be a part of the next big steps in our nations reconciliation journey.


