Missionary activity is, fundamentally, a going out of oneself in love, a reaching out to see God in everyone and to share God's love with each person we meet – *especially our poor and marginalised*.

At St Joseph's we will celebrate a special Mission Day on **Wednesday 25th October** to raise awareness of the need for missionary work, to pray for missionary needs and to raise funds for Catholic Mission. Here at St Joseph's it is also about teaching our students ways in which they can, as children do something to help make a difference in the lives of others.

It is quite timely then during Mission month that we highlight the mission work of our St Joseph's students in the support of the Ugandan Dolls project.

Last year our 3 year six students were able to meet with the founder of the Ugandan Kids charity, Mr Paul Fyth while they attended the Mission Mass in Brisbane. Paul shared with our students some videos and stories of the children at St Joseph's in Uganda. In the pictures we could see how little the school children had as far as school resources were concerned but we could also see how proud the children were to be wearing a school uniform and belonging to a school community.



From this conversation the children were given the project idea of creating some paper dolls wearing our school uniform to make and then sell to raise money to help purchase uniforms for students attending St Joseph's school in Uganda. Over the past two terms the students have planned and created lots of these "Ugandan Dolls" as we call them. We have set a school target of one doll per student here at our school which would mean \$1300 we could pass on to the children of St Joseph's in Uganda.

These dolls are now on display in our front office and for sale at \$10.00ea if you would like to purchase one to display on your fridge at home or desk space at work as a reminder of the helping hand our children here in Weipa have extended to the children of St Joseph's in Uganda.

Next week I will be away with Miss Cook and the Year 6 students on camp from Sunday till Thursday. We are really looking forward to this time away with the students and I know that the students are extremely excited at the prospect of the activities planned for their week away. A big, big thank you to Jamie Dorahy for offering to come along to help out with supervision. It is very much appreciated that his own work and family time has been given up for the week. Thank you also to Alycia Cook for taking on much of the organisation and planning of the camp. I am sure the children will return with lots to share after their time away.

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Classroom News...

Prep... This week in Prep we have been doing lots of fun learning experiences. In Maths group work we did our Perceptual Motor Program (PMP), sorting objects by attributes of shape, colour and size, writing digits and counting forwards and backwards from O-2O. We have been connecting routine events to the different days of the week. In English we did our group work rotations of writing, reading, sight words and the Reading Eggs program. We have been doing a verbal recount of swimming on Fridays, which includes the order of events beginning with getting the bus, then getting in the water, followed by the lesson and finally the return trip back to school. In Science we did a movement dice game. When the dice rolled onto a word we had to do the different actions like a roll, slide, push, pull or spin. In Health we have been learning about staying safe and in Geography we have been learning about special and important places.

Year 1... This week, we have had a big focus on not calling out in class and waiting for our turn to talk. It has taken all week but together we have achieved this. The students have created a bird for our visual arts unit to go with their cultural recount of "How the Birds got their Colours". In mathematics, we have looked at chance and data. In geography, we have looked at places that are managed. In science, we have been looking at places where there is light and places where it is dark and discussed why? We have also learned that we need vibration to make sound happen. The students have continued to enjoy swimming and are demonstrating their organizational skills very well.

If anyone is available between 8:40 and 9:00am, we will continue with student reading in the flexible learning area. Library day will stay on a Friday and Homework will be due on a Monday this term.

Year 2... In Maths our focus has been on counting to and back in 2's, 3's, 5's and 10's. We have been using the hundreds board to help us and yesterday we used a 300 board so we are really improving. We also looked at how zero is really important in numbers and how it affects the value of the number. In Religion we finished our book creator task about Jesus and started building our houses which are made out of clay and other natural materials. These will take a few weeks to complete but the kids are super excited about it. We looks at Toys from the Past and Collette brought in some of her old toys which was really interesting to hear about and where they came from. We also started our Child Safety unit in Health and really enjoyed our first Reading Stamina session. We made 12 mins!

Year 3... This week year 3 has been continuing their work on reviews and critical evaluations. We focussed on reviewing games that provide an overview of the game, the rules and their critical recommendations. In Math we've focussed on revising symmetry and looking at 3D objects. In Science we executed some fun experiments looking at how heat is conducted through materials such as plastic, wood and metal. We also looked at objects that produce their own heat or require it from other areas such as electricity or friction.

This week's golden pencil goes to Ramona Bond.

Year 4... This week in Year 4 we have been learning about decimal numbers and how prevalent they are in everyday life. We are continuing to read our class novel, and have been writing different texts about life as a convict. In Religion was have been learning about relationships and how they heal our world. We have also been talking about Sock it to Poverty, and are collecting coins to donate to poorer children. In Science, we have continued our unit exploring forces and the students are ready to make their marble runs.

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Year 5 - 6... This week we have focused on completing our speeches for Civics & Citizenship. Please be aware that due to other unplanned activities that have cropped up this week we have pushed the due date for this task back to Wednesday 1 November. In Maths the year 5s have been focusing on division and the year 6s have worked with integers on a number line. In science we conducted an investigation about which metal cans conducted solar energy the best by putting half a cup of water in each experiment and comparing it to our control can. We discovered that the black metal can had the highest temperature. We will be looking more closely at the reasons why in weeks to come. Our class has also been busily making Ugandan paper dolls to sell and raise money for students overseas who cannot afford a uniform. The students have enjoyed this process of giving to others and it has connected well to our Civics and Citizenship studies about global citizenship and aid organisations. Many year 6 students have joined WCC in their transition program. This week we made vanilla muffins with Ms Martin and all students had a ball. Next week Miss Cook, Ms Harrison and the year 6 students will be away on camp in Brisbane. The year 5 students will work with Mrs Bienvenu and the year 4s. I know that Mrs B is super excited to get to know the year 5s better and see their leadership skills in action.
