What is mumps?

Mumps is a viral infection and some people will not become unwell at all. Symptoms commonly include fever, swelling and tenderness of the parotid glands (see picture), sore throat, headache and tiredness. Occasionally serious complications can occur but this is usually rare.

It is spread through droplets or saliva (spit) from sneezing or coughing from an infected person. A person with mumps can spread it to over a few days before they even become unwell and then for another (9) nine days.

If someone has mumps they must stay away from work, school and day-care during this infectious time.

Mumps

Dear Parent.

There has been an increase in the number of suspected and confirmed cases of mumps in several districts and communities in Far North Queensland, this includes recent cases in a community near Weipa.

National recommendations are that routinely everyone born during or after 1966 should receive 2 doses of Measles Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccine.

The reasons for the increased number of cases are not clear but may be due to weakening of protection from vaccines a person has had previously.

Because of the recent cases of mumps in your area, I recommend for Napranum, Weipa and Mapoon that until further notice all people older than 8 years and born during or after 1966 are offered a dose of MMR vaccine, including those who have already received 2 doses in the past (provided the person is not pregnant or immunocompromised).

Although MMR may not prevent mumps immediately after exposure, it will prevent cases after subsequent exposures and top up immunity to measles and rubella.
